FALMOUTH SCHOOL'S READING HIGHLIGHTS

At Falmouth School, we understand the vital role reading plays in shaping a young person's success and happiness. However, there is a concerning 'reading gap' among young people in the United Kingdom, where some enjoy a rich reading experience while others face challenges accessing books. Research from the National Literacy Trust reveals that only 1 in 8 disadvantaged students own a book. Additionally, in 2019, a mere 73% of students leaving primary school reached their expected reading levels. This disparity significantly hampers students' ability to navigate the secondary school curriculum, contributing to a broader educational divide. At Falmouth School, we are committed to bridging this 'reading gap' by implementing initiatives to support all students, ensuring they have access to enriching reading experiences.

We are dedicated to fostering a love for reading through a comprehensive set of initiatives. In the mornings, students in Years 7-10 participate in Tutor Reading sessions, where carefully selected books from the PiXL Canon are read aloud, not only igniting a passion for reading but also modelling pronunciation and enhancing vocabulary. Key Stage 3 students benefit from dedicated Library Lessons in our well-resourced library, providing them with dedicated time to access books and engage with reading at their appropriate levels. Teachers across subjects incorporate reading opportunities, utilising 'Popcorn Reading' for collaborative reading and explaining tier 2 and tier 3 vocabulary within lessons. Additionally, our Reading Intervention program, powered by 'Reading Plus' software, assesses students' reading abilities, allowing our literacy team to offer targeted support during tutor time reading intervention slots and in-lesson assistance. These initiatives collectively contribute to creating a supportive reading environment at Falmouth School, ensuring that every student has the opportunity to thrive in their reading journey.

ARTISTIC EXCELLENCE


In response to our current learning module on portraiture, Jacob has created a truly amazing portraiture response in acrylic paints of the celebrity Hugh Grant!
Well done to Mawgan Y10 for his fantastic digital abstract portrait inspired by the abstract expressionist Wassily Kandinsky.




GEOGRAPHY






DESIGN TECHNOLOGY
